Abortion and Infanticide in the Ancient World:

Four months ago I was thinking about the widespread slaughter of innocent babies—abortion and infanticide—and wondered how long it has been going on. Since then, I have learned a great deal.

I have traced abortion in Egypt back to the time of the Exodus, and I am confident that I will find it before the great flood. And infanticide (killing newborn

babies) was as common as abortion in the ancient world.

4th Century BC - The oldest known manuscript of the Hippocratic Oath taken by physicians says this: "Moreover, I will give no sort of medicine to any pregnant woman with a view to destroy the child."

I intend to write an expanded article to be posted on our web site; for those who don't have computers, ask a grandchild to pull it up and print it for you.

1550 BC Time of the Exodus) - Egypt, Ebers Papyrus, the oldest known reference to chemical abortion.

1150 BC - Temple inscription of an underworld demon performing an abortion on a woman, Angkor Wat, Cambodia.

1075 BC - Assyria, Code of Assura--The death penalty for a woman procuring an abortion against her husband's wishes.

700-400 BC - Epic Ramayana (India) - Description of abortions performed by physicians or barbers.

4th Century BC - The oldest known manuscript of the Hippocratic Oath taken by physicians: "Moreover, I will give no sort of medicine to any pregnant woman with a view to destroy the child."

40-80 AD - The Didache, ("Teachings of the Twelve Apostles"), the oldest known Christian doctrinal statement, in which the original apostles summarized the teachings of Jesus: "do not kill a baby by abortion or kill a baby after it is born."

3rd Century AD - Christian theologian Hippolytus of Rome, in "Refutation of all Heresies, Book 9," wrote of the tragedy of women "tightly binding themselves around the middle" so as to expel what was being conceived."

Pray for an end to abortion. Pray also for the many groups and individuals who pursue this very

thing—40 Days for Life, Students for Life, Live Action, and the many compassionate crisis pregnancy centers serving women and infants in their communities.

God and people are so much more than we realize.
